WHAT IS THE AFRICAN AMERICAN EYE DISEASE STUDY?

AFEDS is a study led by Eye Institute, part of Keck School of Medicine of the University of Southern California with funding provided by the National Eye Institute. The purpose of the study is to learn more about eye health in African American adults aged 40 years and older living in Inglewood so that programs can be created to help African American communities, both here and nationwide.

EYE DISEASE IN AFRICAN AMERICANS

Despite being one of the largest minority populations in the US, there are no recent, population-based studies of age related eye disease in African Americans. Knowledge of eye health representing all racial/ethnic groups is important for making national eye health screening & treatment recommendations. Glaucoma is very common in African Americans and may be present without causing symptoms and may go undetected without an eye exam. Diabetic retinopathy is an eye condition that develops in diabetics; however, early detection by an eye exam can slow down disease progression. Many eye conditions can be prevented and treated to prevent vision loss and blindness

A free comprehensive eye exam by a medical doctor who is an eye specialist. A summary of your results, for your eye doctor.

WHY INGLEWOOD?

Inglewood was selected as our recruitment city because the sociodemographic, education, and household income levels are similar to other African American households in the US. We hope to enroll 6,700 residents in our study.

AM I ELIGIBLE?

African American adults 40 years and older living in Inglewood.
